From the Minister

Be Visionary: Think Big was the headline, not in a religious journal but in *Forbes Magazine* a few years ago. For vision and mission support the health of any institution whether for-profit or for-spirit. Though the ends of the vision and way of the mission obviously differ, they have the same purpose – to point the way the institution wants to go (that's the vision) and to lay out the general route for getting there (the mission).

For instance, here's General Electric's vision: *From jet engines to power generation, financial services to plastics, and medical imaging to news and information, GE people worldwide are dedicated to turning imaginative ideas into leading products and services that help solve some of the world's toughest problems.*

And their mission: *GE's mission is to invent the next industrial era, to build, move, power and cure the world.* ;

The mission gets more specific – how will they solve some of the world's toughest problems? Through using industry and technology in construction, transportation, energy, and medicine.

Goals then get even more specific, changing year to year with successes, setbacks, discoveries, and events. You'd have to see each year's annual report to learn what had been set and what accomplished.

The vision informs the mission; the mission informs the goals; and then the mission and vision are used to evaluate the goals. Together they give shape to the life of the company or the congregation. They tell us where we should put our resources.

So as we go through the process of setting our vision and mission statements and then using them to develop goals, I hope you will think big (though maybe not as big as Amazon, whose "vision is to be earth's most customer-centric company; to build a place where people can come to find and discover anything they might want to buy online.") After all, we do have to develop those measurable and attainable goals!

After a blissfully sheltered, upper-middle-class suburban childhood, I found myself simultaneously intrigued and horrified by the racial divide I observed in Boston. From 1984 to 2009 my work in urban neighborhoods and schools left me feeling helpless. Why did people live so differently along racial

lines? Why were student outcomes so divergent? Why did I get so jumpy when talking to a person of color? Where did the fear of saying something stupid or offensive come from, and why couldn't I make it go away? The more I tried to understand racial dynamics, the more confused I became.”; This book chronicles the questions, interactions, conversations, and experiences which helped her understand herself as part of “the story of race.”; The book is available through the OCLN library system and on Amazon (<https://www.amazon.com/Waking-White-Finding-Myself-Story/dp/0991331303>).
